Question:

In relation to Hon WONG Kwok-hing's concern about measures to protect labour rights, the Administration is requested to provide further information on:

- (a) the measures that have been taken/to be taken to help the construction workers of Dickson Construction Co Ltd. to recover their outstanding wages, including the possibility of instituting legal proceedings against Dickson Construction Co Ltd. for non-payment of wages;
- (b) in connection with item (a), the concrete timetable for implementing the measures; and
- (c) other measures that have been taken/to be taken in conjunction with other bureaux/departments for protecting employees' rights in respect of non-payment of wages.

Asked by: Hon. WONG Kwok-hing

Reply:

- (a) The Labour Department has been taking all possible measures to assist the employees of Dickson Construction Co. Ltd. (Dickson) and those of its sub-contractors to recover their outstanding wages. These include :
 - (i) urging Dickson and its sub-contractors to clear outstanding wages to employees under their employment;
 - (ii) urging Dickson to shoulder its vicarious liability under the Employment Ordinance and pay the first two months' unpaid wages to the employees of its sub-contractors;
 - (iii) assisting the employees to file their claims at the Labour Tribunal for adjudication;
 - (iv) assisting the employees to apply for ex-gratia payment from the Protection of Wages on Insolvency Fund;
 - (v) referring the employees to the Legal Aid Department for assistance in the presentation of winding-up/bankruptcy petitions against Dickson and the sub-contractors as appropriate; and
 - (vi) commencing full investigation on suspected wage offences. If there is sufficient evidence, we will take out prosecution.

- (b) We have been implementing all the measures listed in (a)(i) to (vi) above.
- (c) We are working closely with other relevant bureaux and departments on possible measures to further safeguard the labour rights and interests of employees engaged in public works contracts. Measures being explored include tighter sub-contractor management; payment of workers' wages through auto-pay; wider use of written employment contracts; employment of on-site labour relations officers to monitor payment of wages; and imposing penalty on contractors who default payment of wages.

Question :

The Labour Department organised 11 large-scale job fairs for job-seekers living in remote areas in 2005. Of the 11 821 vacancies provided, 88% offered a monthly salary below \$8,000, which was rather low. If such large-scale job fairs are to be held in future, will a travel allowance for working across districts be provided?

Reply

The purpose of these job fairs was to bring employment opportunities to job-seekers living in remote districts. These fairs also enabled the job-seekers to attend job interviews on the spot and subsequently get employment without having to travel to urban areas for job applications. As the job fairs have achieved the purpose of saving the time and money of job-seekers in travelling to urban areas to seek employment, we do not have plans to provide travelling allowance for them.

Question :

In 2005, 11 large-scale job fairs were organised for job-seekers living in remote areas. The total expenditure for staging the 11 job fairs was \$748,000, with each job fair mounted at an average cost of \$68,000. However, only a total of 1 568 on-the-spot placements were recorded and it is not clear how many job-seekers were placed in employment after the job fairs. Will the Labour Department reassess the cost-effectiveness of these job fairs?

Asked by: Hon. CHAN Yuen-han

Reply:

The job fairs provided opportunities for job-seekers residing in remote areas to have information on job vacancies available for selection. These fairs also enabled job-seekers to attend interviews with prospective employers. If found suitable, some of them would be employed on the spot while others could also be interviewed after the job fairs and be offered employment subsequently. By bringing vacancies to remote districts, the job fairs also saved the time and money of job-seekers in travelling to urban areas for job applications. Feedback from employers and job-seekers was very positive. Overall, we consider that these job fairs were effective in helping job-seekers find employment and employers recruit suitable staff.

In the table giving a breakdown by nature of illness under Question Serial No. 0902, 1 814 cases were confirmed as caused by work. Is there any further breakdown by statutory occupational disease?

Reply:

Of the 1 814 patients, 216 had diseases or injuries caused by work. Of these 216 patients, 174 suffered from occupational injuries and 42 from occupational diseases prescribed in the Second Schedule of the Employees' Compensation Ordinance (Cap. 282), including 39 cases of tenosynovitis of hand or forearm and 3 cases of occupational contact dermatitis.

Question :

Regarding the breakdown by industry of cases involving arrears of wages, the Labour Department only maintains figures on cases involving more than 20 employees. This cannot fully reflect the situation of non-payment of wages in various industries. Will the Labour Department change its mode of collecting information (e.g. by keeping records by amount of wages in arrears per employee and industry)?

Reply:

At present, the Labour Department compiles statistics on breakdown of labour disputes (i.e. cases involving more than 20 employees) by industry but does not keep such breakdown in respect of labour claims (i.e. cases involving 20 employees or less). Maintaining additional breakdown statistics on labour claims would require considerable resources in view of the vast number of such claims (totalling 25,952 for the year 2005). Moreover, the existing statistics on labour disputes already gives a good indication of the wage default problem in different industries. For these reasons, we have no plan to compile additional breakdown statistics on labour claims at present.
