



# Work Safety Alert Fall from Roof

**1. Date of Accident :** September 2017

**2.** Place of Accident: The roof of a residential building

## 3. Summary:

A worker while carrying out pest control work on the roof of a residential building fell to death from the unprotected roof edge to the podium floor.

## 4. Work Safety Alert for Proprietors/ Employers:

To prevent any workers/ employees from falling from height, the proprietors/ employers engaged in any work at dangerous places such as roofs of buildings should:

- appoint a competent person to conduct task-specific risk assessments to identify all potential hazards associated with the work, particularly those dangerous places where workers will work and are liable to fall from height;
- formulate safe work methods and procedures with due regard to the results of the risk assessments, which should comply with the requirements of safety legislation and relevant codes of practice;
- provide and maintain suitable and adequate safe means of access to and egress from the dangerous places;
- erect suitable guard-rails along the edges of the dangerous places from which workers/ employees are liable to fall from height;





- if erection of guard-rails at the edges of the dangerous places is impracticable and working at such dangerous places cannot be avoided, set up a personal fall arresting system by providing every worker/employee concerned with a suitable safety harness with its lanyard continuously attached to a suitable and secure anchorage throughout the work and take all reasonable steps to ensure the proper use of the personal fall arresting system by the worker/employee;
- provide all workers/ employees involved with the necessary safety information, instruction and training to ensure that they are familiar with the safe work procedures and safety measures; and
- establish and implement an effective monitoring and control system to ensure all safety measures are strictly followed.
